

## Jacob Chang Convocation speech

## Good morning Buckeyes!

Three years ago, I had just left my home in Nanjing, China, and flew 10,000 miles over the Pacific Ocean to this beautiful city by myself as an international student. Like many of you, I was both excited and nervous about starting my journey at Ohio State. Sitting like you are now as a new Buckeye, I would never have dreamed that I will have the privilege of serving as your Undergraduate Student Body President this year.

Since day one of my journey here, many have asked me the same question: why Ohio State? When I reflect on this question every year, I always have a different answer. As a freshman, I would tell you it's because OSU is a world-renowned academic institution. As a sophomore, I would tell you it's because the heart-felt Buckeye traditions. In 1902, football player and men's glee club member Fred Cornell penned the lyrics after one of the Buckeyes' saddest hours: an 86-to-nothing loss to "that team up north." His words were first performed by the men's glee club in 1903.

Three years later, in 1906, before the Ohio State-Michigan game, *The Lantern* published Cornell's Carmen Ohio, inspiring an overwhelmingly positive response.

For more than a century, this melody has echoed in the heart of every Buckeye.
