12 13 14 15	Whereas over 30,000 Americans died in 2015 as a result of an opioid overdose, making the nation in the midst of the largest opioid crisis ever seen, and it could potentially strike The Ohio State University at any point in time, and
16 17 18	Whereas around 11 people die everyday in Ohio alone due to unintentional drug overdoses, ² and
19 20 21	Whereas this number of 30,000 American deaths in 2015 as a result of opioids is only expected to increase in 2018, and
22 23 24	Whereas students at many universities of different sizes and geographic areas have experienced opioid overdoses and death as a result of opioid addiction, and
25 26 27 28 29	Whereas naloxone (on the market as the brand "Narcan") is available on campus only through the Wilce Student Health Center by paying a \$30 fee and taking a training course, and there is currently no easy, quick access to naloxone and other overdose preventing medicines on campus for emergencies, and
30 31 32 33 34	Whereas naloxone has no pharmacological effect and has no potential for abuse, can be safely administered by intranasal, intravenous, or intramuscular injection, works rapidly (in 2-8 minutes) and wears off in 20-90 minutes giving the victim time to be treated, and produces no effect if opioids are not present, ³ and
35 36 37	Whereas the annual Alcohol, Drug Use and Student Wellness report ⁴ put out by the Center for the Study of Student Life does not mention the number of opioid overdoses and deaths, and

Let it Further Be Resolved that all fraternity and sorority houses be equipped with a dosage of naloxone and at least one fraternity/sorority member or house resident be trained in the recognition of an overdose and administration of naloxone, and Let it Further Be Resolved that moving forward, we call on the university to include the number of opioid overdoses and deaths in its annual Alcohol, Drug Use and Student Wellness report, and Let it Further Be Resolved that students who report or are involved in an opioid overdose will receive amnesty from charges pertaining to the overdose if drugs were illicitly obtained, and Let it Further Be Resolved that a Good Samaritan clause be created in the Code of Student Conduct to protect students who step in to help their friends and fellow classmates in the case of an opioid overdose, and Let it Further Be Resolved that the Undergraduate Student Government will help to find alternate avenues of funding if funds can't be found in the University's budget, including reaching out to Franklin County Public Health who funded the OSUPD's naloxone and reaching out to Adapt Pharma Ltd., which has previously donated free doses of naloxone to universities who request it.
