110	2. Students are fully expected to attend each and every class meeting scheduled during		
111	the normal meeting times, however, things do come up and some professors seem to be		
112	much more understanding of this than others. The goal of this shared governance		
113	proposal is to create a universal policy for all professors and classes to follow across the		
114	entire university. Students will still be expected to meet all of the requirements of each		
115	course for which they are registered, and students will still be expected to attend normally

  come in the form of doctor's excuse, religious calendar, court summons, or death
  announcement, etc.
